



SUNDAY OF THE MOST HOLY TRINITY / FIRST SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST - JUNE 4TH



Holy Trinity Sunday is the first Sunday following the Feast of Pentecost in the Western Church. It has also been adopted by many of the Eastern Churches in recent years, although every Liturgy celebrates the Mystery of the Most Holy Trinity. This celebration emphasizes the belief in the revelation of one God, yet three divine persons. It was not uniquely celebrated in the early Church, but with the advent of new, sometimes heretical, thinking often gives rise to the Church's taking the opportunity to explain and celebrate its own teachings and traditions.

In the early 4th century when the Arian heresy was spreading, the early church, recognizing the inherent Christological and Trinitarian implications, prepared special prayers to celebrate and proclaim the Blessed Trinity. Pope John XXII (fourteenth century) instituted the celebration as a feast of the universal Church; the celebration became a solemnity after the liturgical reforms for the Latin Church following Vatican Council II.

The fundamental dogma, on which everything in Christianity is based, is that of the Blessed Trinity in whose name all Christians are baptized. The feast of the Holy Trinity needs to be understood and celebrated as a prolongation of the mysteries of Christ and as the solemn expression of our faith in this triune life of the Divine Persons, to whom we have access by Baptism and by the Redemption won for us by Christ. Only in heaven will properly understand what it means, in union with Christ, to share as sons and daughters in the very life of God.

The feast of the Holy Trinity was introduced in the ninth century and was inserted into the general liturgical calendar of the Church (as mentioned above) by Pope John XXII in the fourteenth century. Prayer and praise of the Holy Trinity is found throughout the liturgy of the Church. The Church constantly causes the faithful to praise and adore the thrice-holy God who has shown his mercy towards us and has invited us to share in his life.

The feast is situated after the celebration of Pentecost because, in many ways, it is the finale to all the preceding feasts of the Church. All three Persons contributed to and shared in the work of redemption. The Father sent his Son to earth, for "God so loved the world that he sent his only-begotten Son." The Father called us to faith. The Son, our Savior Jesus Christ, became man and died for us. He redeemed us and made us children of God. He is the liturgist par excellence to whom we are united in all sacred functions. After Christ's Ascension the Holy Spirit became our Teacher, our Leader, our Guide, our Consoler.

The feast of the Holy Trinity, in many ways, is the feast of gratitude over all the blessings and Gifts of the Christmas and Easter seasons; this mystery is a synthesis of Christmas, Epiphany, Easter,

Ascension and Pentecost. The celebration of this Sunday dedicated to the Mystery of the Holy Trinity should lead us to recognize that every Sunday is sanctified and consecrated to the Triune God. Sunday after Sunday we should recall is a spirit of gratitude the gifts which the Holy Trinity is bestowing upon us. Recall: The Father created us; Sunday of the “Day of the Lord,” the day of his resurrection. The Holy Spirit sanctified us, made us his temple; on Sunday the Holy Spirit descended upon the infant Church. Sunday, then, IS the day of the Holy Trinity: Father, Son and Holy Spirit.


THE SEASON OF PENTECOST - THE FIRST FOUR SUNDAYS

The evangelist Luke in the book of the Acts of the Apostles fixed the descent of the Holy Spirit on the assembled disciples on the fiftieth day after the resurrection of the Lord Jesus from the dead (Acts 2:1). He had already fixed the day of the ascension on the fortieth day after the resurrection (Acts 1:3). He himself, however, did not distinguish between the event of the ascension and the event of the resurrection in the gospel (24:51). Neither did the evangelist John distinguish between the descent of the Holy Spirit and the resurrection of the Lord (20:22). Therefore, the event of the resurrection, the ascension, and Pentecost are a single historical and theological event, although the church’s liturgical celebration has separated them since the time of Luke and the apostles. As is well known, forty symbolizes a complete period of time in which a great saving event is completed. Fifty symbolizes the fullness of time — the completion of seven weeks. Therefore it is called in the Torah the Feast of Weeks or the Feast of Ansara — Gathering Together — to celebrate the anniversary of the giving of the Torah to Moses and the ratifying of the covenant between God and His people by the hand of Moses on the day of assembly at the foot of Mount Sinai (Exodus 19:16–25, 24:1–11). This was the end and goal of the event of the exodus from Egypt — that is, of the Feast of Passover.

Luke applied this custom to the new Christian community: on the fiftieth day after the exodus of God’s people from Egypt, God gave his people the law at Sinai; and on the fiftieth day after Jesus’ death, resurrection, and passage to the Father, Jesus gave his disciples the Holy Spirit, the law of the New Covenant. At the same time, the Feast of Pentecost is the beginning of an ecclesiastical liturgical season extending approximately eighteen weeks, from Pentecost Sunday until September 14, the Feast of the Cross. It is the time of the Holy Spirit.

Since Maronite tradition sets no special readings for this season, the Patriarchal Liturgical Commission has taken into consideration three complementary themes about the Holy Spirit and have arranged the readings based on themes. The first four Sundays after the Feast of Pentecost celebrate the giving of the Holy Spirit to the apostles and to the church. The church receives the Holy Spirit and is born again. This is intimately related to the Feast of Pentecost as a historical saving event.

BIRTH OF JOHN THE BAPTIZER - JUNE 24TH



In both the scriptures and in the Church's liturgy John the Baptizer is referred to as an angel, prophet, apostle, hermit and martyr, for these terms well describe his life and work. John, like the angels was sent from God to be the messenger of the Lord. His message was that of the prophets who came before him: repent for the messiah of God is at hand. Like the apostles who followed him, John pointed to Jesus and proclaimed him as the "Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world." He prepares for his ministry as a hermit in the desert, living a life of prayer, fasting and continence. And, like all those who dare to proclaim the truth, he suffered a martyr's death in fidelity to the word of God.

John, in fact, closely resembles the Lord Jesus in his birth, life and death. As Jesus was perfect, so John sought out, not only personal perfection, but also the perfect One, Jesus Christ.

The birth of John was announced by the Archangel Gabriel who would also announce Christ's birth. His birth, like that of the Lord, was surrounded by improbability and wonder: for an aged couple, with no hope of offspring, the angel gives the joyful news of the birth of a son, John. While in the womb, John was sanctified for his mission of preaching repentance and pointing out the messiah. Before their births Jesus and John encountered each other in the persons of their mothers. As Mary greeted Elizabeth, John (still in the womb) jumped for joy as he recognized the presence of Jesus in the womb of Mary. Thus John was born to grace before his human birth. Since he was to prepare the Lord's way, it was only proper that he should be prepared by God's grace for his prophetic work.

MAY THE PRAYERS OF JOHN THE BAPTIZER BE WITH US. AMEN.

FEAST OF SAINTS PETER & PAUL - JUNE 25TH / ACTUAL FEAST - 29TH

Peter was originally from the town of Bethsaida on the shores of the Lake of Tiberias in the region of Galilee. In Aramaic, his name was Simon, son of John. The Lord gave him the name Peter, which means rock. He was married and worked with his brother Andrew as a fisherman at Capernaum. Almost nothing is known about his family life. Peter and Andrew were disciples of John the Baptizer and, when called by Christ, they became his followers. Peter had a fiery temperament and was, at times, somewhat hot-headed. Yet he loved Jesus and followed him with all his spirit. At Caesarea Philippi the Lord handed the care of the Church over to Peter and confirmed Peter's primacy after the resurrection. After the ascension Peter exercised his authority over the Church through his preaching and teaching in Antioch, Corinth and Rome. Peter wrote two epistles and the gospel of Mark preserves much of his teaching. He suffered and died in Rome where he was

imprisoned and eventually crucified upside down on the Vatican Hill on the twenty-ninth day of June in the year 67. The Emperor Constantine constructed a church over his tomb.



The Apostle Paul was born at Tarsus in Cilicia around the year 7. He called himself “Saul” and says concerning himself that he was “circumcised on the eighth day, being of the stock of Israel and the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew of Hebrew origins; in legal observance I was a Pharisee, and so zealous that I persecuted the church...But those things I used to consider gain I have now reappraised as loss in the light of Christ.” (Philippians 3: 5-7) He acquired knowledge of both Greek and Hebrew cultures and studied theology in Jerusalem under the great Rabbi Gemaliel. He assisted in the persecution of Christians and was present at the death of Stephen. He was converted when the Lord appeared to him on the road to Damascus. He was baptized and began to preach the gospel to the gentiles. He traveled throughout the Mediterranean and some claim that he went as far as Spain. He was arrested and brought before the Jewish and Roman authorities. Because he was a Roman citizen he appealed his case to Rome where he was beheaded. The letters of Paul are an incomparable

source of Christian doctrine and are essential for a thorough understanding of Christ.

The Feast of Peter and Paul is traditionally a Holy Day of Obligation in all the Eastern Churches. While the obligation has been transferred to Sunday, June 25th, we are still encouraged to celebrate this feast with solemnity and prayer.

To the Lord, who chose Peter to be chief of the apostles and Paul to be the apostle to the nations, be glory and praise for ever! May their prayers be with us. Amen.

WHY DO WE NOW HAVE TWO READINGS?

Chorbishop Seely Beggiani in his book on the Maronite Liturgy tells us: “Traditionally, the Maronite Church had several scriptural readings, numbering as many as six and taken from various sections of both the Old and New Testaments. According to their ordination, cantors are to read the Psalms, lectors, the Books of the Prophets, subdeacons, the Books of the Acts of the Apostles and the Catholic Epistles, deacons, the Epistles of St. Paul, and archdeacons, the Gospels.”

In the revised Qurbono and Lectionary, the Maronite Patriarchal Liturgical Commission decided to include only New Testament Readings until a new Old Testament translation could be completed and made available in the Arabic. That work was only recently completed and made available along with a list of Old Testament Readings for the Sunday Qurbono. Both Eparchies here in the United States have made these readings available for our use on Sundays throughout the year. The use of both Old and New Testament readings is not a change but a return to our tradition.
