### Easter, Pasch, Resurrection Day-What's In The Name?



Traditionally, the term Easter has been thought to have come from the Anglo-Saxon *Eastre*, a goddess of spring. Thus, Easter bunnies and all the other symbols for fertility and spring. Recently, however, several scholars have challenged this traditional thinking, finding it more likely to be a misunderstanding and translation of another Latin term for the Resurrection, *hebdomada alba*, taken from the white garments worn by the newly-baptized. The plural of this word, albae, was also used. It is thought that the misunderstanding of this term by the Germans has given us our modern term, Easter. The Old High German language wrongly understood the plural of the early Latin term to be the word for dawn, and translated it into their own language as *Ostern*—thus our word, Easter. Whatever theory you find appealing or more plausible,

the fact is our modern term Easter is used by us to mean the day of the Lord's Resurrection.

Another term for the day of the Lord's Resurrection is Pasch from the most important feast of the Jewish calendar, celebrated from the evening of 14 Nisan until the 21 Nisan, March/April). Every male Israelite was obliged to make a pilgrimage to Jerusalem for this celebration. The term Pasch is a Greek transliteration of the Aramaic for the Hebrew word *Pesach* meaning passage. The *Pesach* feast of the Jews was instituted to commemorate the deliverance of the Israelites from Egypt when the angel of death passed over their houses, sparing their first-born. On the evening of the 14 Nisan, every Israelite family gathered together for the ritual eating of the Paschal lamb, a ceremony especially commemorative of the departure from Egypt. During all eight days of the feast no leavened bread could be eaten; hence, the *Pasch* is often referred to as the Feast of Unleavened Bread. The first and last days of the octave were observed with Sabbath rests and assemblies. The rules for the celebration of the *Pasch* are found in Ex. 12 and Lev. 23. Christ's death and resurrection took place during the celebration of the *Pasch*; and Christians commonly use the name to refer to the feast of the Resurrection, or Easter, which is known as the Paschal Feast. Many of the Eastern Churches (notably, the Byzantine) refer to the celebration of *Pascha* to denote the day of the Lord's Resurrection.

Whatever name you choose to call today, Psalm 118:24 summarizes its importance by proclaiming: **"This is the day that the LORD has made; let us be glad and rejoice in it!"** All of the Christian calendar is centered upon this event. This is the day for which we have been preparing by our prayer and fasting; by scripture reading and meditation. All Liturgies, all devotions, all prayer forms have as their focal point, the Resurrection of Jesus Christ. Our lives find importance and full meaning as well in the celebration of the Resurrection of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. This is **THE** day the Lord has made!

Our prayer for you today is that the Risen Lord will touch your life in a special way and that you will, through his grace, be open to the mystery and majesty that comes from the presence of God within and among us. May we proclaim fearlessly and with the deepest faith: *Christ is Risen! He is truly Risen!* 

### THE SEASON OF THE GLORIOUS RESURRECTION

The Church celebrates the Resurrection of our Lord as the Feast of feasts. After being plunged into the darkness of the crucifixion and death of Jesus we are now filled with the light of the resurrection. The cross which was the instrument of death has now become the glorious beacon which enlightens the world.

In order to express its joy the Church extends the celebration of the resurrection for a week of weeks, that is, for fifty days. The Sundays of the Season of Resurrection are as follows:

Resurrection of the Lord New Sunday: First Sunday of Resurrection Second Sunday of Resurrection Third Sunday of Resurrection Fourth Sunday of Resurrection Fifth Sunday of Resurrection Sixth Sunday of Resurrection: Sunday after the Ascension Pentecost

The Season of Resurrection begins with the feast of the Resurrection and ends with the gift of the Holy Spirit on Pentecost. On the fourtieth day of this season (the Thursday after the Fifth Sunday of Resurrection) the feast of the Ascension of the Lord is celebrated.

Memorials (feasts of the saints) do not replace the Sundays of this season, the feast of the Ascension, or the weekdays immediately following Resurrection Sunday.

The weekdays of this season have their own proper prayers which are given in the Common of the Week: Resurrection. Memorials may be celebrated on all the weekdays except those of the Week of *Hawareyeen* (Easter Week).

Today the Church and her children rejoice for our Lord and Savior has risen from the dead. The resurrection of the Lord is the central event of our salvation, the one that gives meaning to who we are and what we do. Every celebration of the Eucharist and the other mysteries refers to it as the source of inspiration and meaning.

The resurrection is the Feast of feasts, the queen of all feasts. Originally the Church celebrated only one feast, the resurrection itself, which was recalled and renewed each Sunday at the celebration of the Divine Mysteries. Soon, however, it began to recall the Passover of the Lord and his victorious resurrection in a special way once a year, in addition to the weekly commemoration of the resurrection. Eventually this annual celebration of the Lord's resurrection was prepared for by a season of prayer, fasting and penance—Lent, and the feast itself was extended for fifty days.

The Church, thus, now celebrates the resurrection of the Lord for a week of weeks (fifty days): from the Sunday of the Resurrection to Pentecost Sunday (the fiftieth day).

Today's feast is one of joy and peace:

Peace to those who are far and good hope to those who are near. For Christ has risen from the grave and has gathered those who were scattered and given them joy.



The joy and peace that flow from the Lord's resurrection are expressed today by the rite of peace which follows the gospel in the Divine Mysteries. The cross is removed from the tomb where it has rested since Great Friday and is draped in white. It is carried through the Church accompanied by hymns of praise and joy. The priest solemnly blesses the congregation with the glorious cross and then presents it to them that they might reverence it.

By his living cross Christ has saved us from going astray and given us a way to heaven. Through the cross peace and harmony reign among God's people and we are led to perfection.

And so filled with peace and with joyful hearts we proclaim:

A glorious morning has dawned, and night has fled. Light has conquered, and night has been destroyed.

### NEW SUNDAY-APRIL 7TH

New Sunday is the eighth day of the Church's celebration of the resurrection. The first week of the Season of Resurrection, the Week of *Hawareyeen*, has come to a conclusion. During this week we have seen the various appearances of the Lord: to Mary Magdalene, the disciples at the Sea of Tiberias, to Peter, the disciples on the road to Emmaus, and the disciples gathered in the upper room. In overcoming the hesitation of Thomas, the Lord revealed to the apostles the truth of the resurrection. *Christ has risen, truly risen!* 

New Sunday once and for all puts an end to the old way of looking at the Lord. He is no longer revealed in the flesh (as the disciples experienced him during his life with them); nor in glory (as Thomas did). From now on, he is revealed in Spirit, through the experience of faith and in the Mysteries (Sacraments). Only in the Spirit is there a sharing in his mystery of redemption. His word is crystal clear and resounds for all ages and generations.

"You have become a believer; because you saw me. Blessed are they who have not seen and have believed."
